DISPATCHING EXCELLENCE: DONNA WUNSCHEL NOMINATED FOR STATE LEADERSHIP AWARD

Seekonk's own Donna Wunschel has been nominated for the prestigious **Massachusetts Telecommunicator Awards – Leader of the Year**, recognizing her outstanding leadership in the 911 profession. Presented by the Massachusetts Communications Supervisors Association (MCSA), this honor celebrates individuals who exemplify excellence, professionalism, and unwavering dedication to public safety communications.



Donna's calm, steady presence has been a cornerstone of Seekonk's emergency response system. As a leader, she supports and elevates her team, mentors with compassion, and never loses sight of the life-saving work happening every day behind the scenes. Her nomination is a testament to the high standards she sets and the respect she's earned across the state.

The winner will be announced at the MCSA Annual Meeting on Wednesday, June 18, 2025—but in the eyes of her colleagues and community, Donna is already a true leader and a hometown hero. Congratulations, Donna, and thank you for being the voice of calm when it matters most.





REFLECTING ON TOWN MEETING

On Monday, May 12, over **350 residents** gathered in the Seekonk High School auditorium for our Annual Town Meeting—a clear sign that civic participation is alive and well in our community. Thank you to everyone who took the time to show up, ask questions, and vote. These shared moments of local democracy are powerful, even when they stretch nearly four hours.

One of the most impactful votes of the night was the approval of a **\$10.4 million** renovation to the Seekonk Public Library. This project has been years in the making, shaped by community input and a thorough feasibility study. While the library's role as a cultural and educational hub hasn't changed, the building itself has aged—without significant upgrades since its construction in 1978. The renovation will tackle the basics first: electrical, plumbing, HVAC, and fire safety systems, which make up nearly 90% of the total cost. The plan also includes improvements to accessibility, roof and siding repairs, and reimagined interior spaces, including dedicated areas for children and teens.



This article wouldn't be complete without noting that the vote passed with a strong majority—**240 to 74**—clearing the two-thirds threshold required for borrowing. But this isn't the final step. The project now heads to a **special election**, scheduled for **July 21st**, where voters will decide whether to approve a temporary tax increase through a Proposition 2½ debt exclusion. If successful, the average household would see an estimated \$100 increase annually.

The proposed \$9.5 million **South End Fire Station**—submitted via citizen petition—did not receive the two-thirds majority needed for borrowing authorization. While the final vote (112 in favor, 108 opposed) shows the community is clearly engaged with this issue, questions around long-term staffing and overall cost remain

unresolved. The conversation doesn't end here, and I remain committed to working with residents, public safety officials, and town leadership to explore viable solutions.

We also approved the **Fiscal Year 2026 budget**, totaling \$73.3 million—a 3.3% increase from the current year. As part of that, voters supported an additional \$113,000 for the school budget, bringing it to \$33.85 million. While that increase was meaningful, it fell short of meeting the full \$2.1 million in identified service-level needs. Like many communities constrained by Proposition 2½, we're left making difficult trade-offs—resulting in cuts to staffing, supplies, and student support services. These challenges demand continued collaboration between the Town, Board of Selectmen, School Committee, and School Department.

Finally, several **capital investments** were greenlit, addressing a wide range of infrastructure and safety needs. Highlights include:

- \$825,000 for continued development of Medeiros Farm into a public park;
- \$140,000 for five automatic external defibrillators (AEDs) call cabinets;
- \$95,000 for a DPW excavator;
- \$70,000 for mobile data terminals in police cruisers;
- \$26,000 for traffic light cameras at Arcade Avenue and Ledge Road;
- \$300,000 for asbestos tile removal at the high school;
- \$150,000 for a new heating system at the middle school;
- \$97,600 for energy-efficient lighting at the public safety building;
- \$77,500 for upgraded door locks at the high school and Martin School.

Every one of these decisions reflects community priorities—and more importantly, the willingness of our residents to shape Seekonk's future together. Thank you again for being part of it.





SUMMER HOURS TRIAL PROGRAM AT TOWN OFFICES

The Town of Seekonk is launching a **Summer Hours** Trial Program to better serve our residents while also providing a more flexible schedule for staff during the warmer months. Beginning **June 9, 2025** and running through **August 29, 2025**, Town Hall and participating departments will adjust their weekly hours to include extended hours Monday through Thursday and early closure on Fridays.

What's Changing?

- Monday–Thursday: Offices will open earlier and/or stay open later.
- Friday: Some departments will close early, while others will not be open at all.

This trial is designed to:

- Make it easier for residents to access services outside the traditional business hours.
- Provide more efficient service during peak times.
- Offer a better work-life balance for employees.



Please note: Each department will operate on its own modified schedule based on operational needs and staffing. We strongly encourage residents to check individual department hours before planning a visit. We value your feedback and will be collecting input throughout the trial to help determine the future of the program.

Whether supporting seniors, connecting residents with critical resources, or simply lending a listening ear, she works tirelessly to make sure no one in Seekonk is left behind.

YOUR TAX DOLLARS, EXPLAINED: THE FY26 BUDGET IN REAL TERMS

This year's **\$73.3 million** general fund budget reflects our continued commitment to maintaining high-quality public services while planning responsibly for the future. It also reminds us of an important truth: for **every \$100 in taxes**, nearly every dollar is already spoken for.

Roughly **\$49** of every \$100 goes directly to **education**—including our public schools, special education programs, and vocational school assessments. That's a long-standing investment in the next generation, and one that continues to be our largest and most critical responsibility. **Public safety**—our police, fire, and dispatch services—accounts for about **\$17**, ensuring that we have trained, equipped professionals ready to respond in times of crisis. Another **\$19** supports **employee benefits and insurance**, including health coverage and pension obligations for the people who deliver town services every day.

The rest is spread across the full range of operations: **\$6** supports **general government**—from elections and inspections to IT and legal services. Only **\$3** supports our **Department of Public Works**, which manages everything from roads and snow removal to stormwater and trash. **Library and recreation** services receive just **\$2**, while **\$4** goes toward paying down **debt** on past capital projects like school upgrades and major equipment purchases.

Every dollar in this budget plays a role in keeping the town running smoothly and safely. If you're interested in where your money goes, I encourage you to explore the full FY26 Budget Book available on our website. It's your budget—and we're proud of the work it represents.





FROM RESERVE FUNDS TO WARRANT ARTICLES: WHAT THE FINANCE COMMITTEE REALLY DOES

The Finance Committee plays a vital but often behind-the-scenes role in town government. As the Advisory Board, this seven-member committee—appointed by the Town Moderator—reviews all financial matters brought before Town Meeting, including the annual operating budget and any article that involves appropriating town funds. Their mission is simple: to provide independent, informed recommendations to help voters make sound decisions.

In the months leading up to the Town Meetings, the committee meets with department heads, analyzes budget proposals, and examines each monetary article in detail. Their recommendations, printed in the Town Meeting warrant, represent hours of review, discussion, and a commitment to balancing community priorities with fiscal responsibility. If you've ever wondered who vets the spending requests before they reach the floor, it's the Finance Committee doing the legwork.

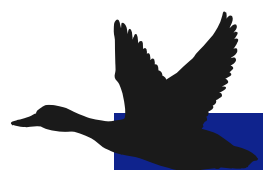

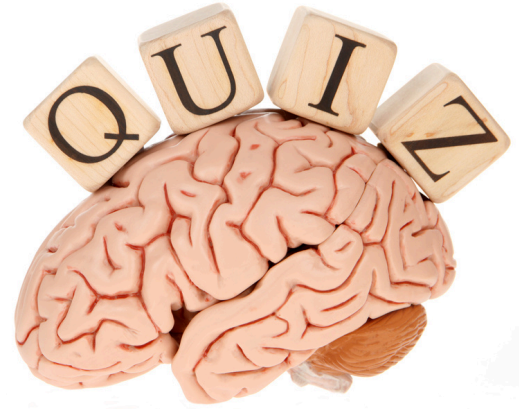
WHAT WELL-KNOWN MASSACHUSETTS HIKING TRAIL HAS A SECTION THAT RUNS THROUGH SEEKONK?

Located along Route 6, the theater became a beloved local destination for families, couples, and moviegoers throughout the region before closing in the 1990s.
